

Building Blocks to an Oracy Assembly

- Rules for talk- especially effective listening
- Sentence stems
- Pupils exposed to varied groupings
- Oracy detectives









Logistics to consider

- How will you choose to organise this and will it scale up?
- What will your timings look like and how will you plan this?
- What staffing requirements will suit you and support the children?

- Do you have interesting stimuli to hook and enthuse the children?
- How will you pull children's attention?
- Will you use **oracy detectives** and what will their role be?

A Department for Education (DfE) spokesperson told BBC News the tests were "designed to be challenging".

The government's Standards and Testing Agency says the purposes of Sats tests are to:

- help measure pupils' progress
- identify if they need any extra help in certain areas
- assess schools' performances
- produce national performance data.

Last year, <u>59% of Year 6 pupils met the</u> <u>expected levels</u> in reading, writing and maths - down from 65% in 2019.

- Know we are paying attention
- Use magnet eyes
- Respond appropriately
- Can say what we heard (summarise)

- Face our audience
- Take turns
- Show respect
- Understand volume
- Ask questions



- Know it is always OK to change our mind
- Try to use clever vocabulary









Listening Ladder/Discussion Guidelines

Rights of the Child



Article 24 -

Health, water, food, environment

Children have the right to the best health care possible, clean water to drink, healthy food and a clean and safe environment to live in. All adults and children should have information about how to stay safe and healthy.





Structure of an assembly

- Relatable talking point to enter the assembly and discuss
- Establish behaviour rules, expectations, protocols and recap guidelines
- Introduce subject matter
- Build upon subject matter
- Give further detail/context/opinions
- Contentious talking Point
- End with a link to school vales, rights of the child or relevant school curriculum area
- Oracy detective praise
- CLOSE- Expectations, structure!
